From the Directors

Congratulations to you, the graduating students of Batch 17, School of Ministry, Spring Term 2024.

I am sure the past three months have had many defining moments for many of you. As you graduate, we encourage you to keep pressing upward, onward, and toward the goal of the high call of God in Christ Jesus.

You have chosen for your graduation the theme, **Seekers** from Jeremiah 29:13, "And you will seek Me and find Me, when you search for Me with all your heart."

The word "seek" is a verb but the word "seeker" is an adjective that describes a person who is in search of something. Martin Luther once said, "The heart of religion is in its personal pronoun," and in this case, a seeker.



So, we start with the most basic question – what are we called to seek for? Well, for a start, we are not called to be "attention" seekers. Neither are we called to seek for wealth, power, fame, or a name for ourselves, or what the "unregenerate" normally seek after. The Bible gives us clear parameters on what "seekers" are to seek.

Let's begin with the most well-known scripture which is Matthew 6:33, "But seek first the kingdom of God and His righteousness, and all these things shall be added to you."

Now the word "first" means first. There's no getting around it. If the Kingdom is not first in your life, then it is second or third or somewhere down the line. And if it is not first, then it is not right. You are missing the mark.





Your seeking mind will determine how much you progress. Paul says to seek the things that are above, where Christ is. But does seeking the Kingdom first mean we can't do anything else? The answer to that is obviously "no." But seeking first the Kingdom means nothing else comes first. Not your family, spouse, career. Not even your feelings. God doesn't say "Seek first the kingdom as long as you are not tired. If you are tired, then do whatever feels right." When the Kingdom really comes first in your life, it doesn't matter if you don't feel like it. First is first.

And the promise of seeking first the Kingdom is that those "things" we normally would seek for would come to us. That doesn't mean people who don't seek the Kingdom won't have things. People who don't seek the kingdom also have things. So, this is not a scripture about what you have. It is a scripture about *where you live*. You live in this Kingdom and you have the things. They don't live in the Kingdom and they have those things. But where do you want to be? It is not a question of having. It is a question of where you live, and how you get these things!

I would like to introduce you to a **seeker** in the Bible and he is found in the parable of the merchant seeking for goodly pearls. This is in Matthew 13:45-46, "Again, the kingdom of heaven is like a merchant seeking beautiful pearls, who, when he had found one pearl of great price, went and sold all that he had and bought it."

In this parable, we are introduced to a merchant seeking for the pearl of great price. Obviously, he had an eye for such things. He knew the value of pearls but he also knew when he saw one that was priceless. And when he finally found a pearl that he had been seeking all his life, he went and sold all he had to buy the pearl.

Now, the Kingdom of God is not the pearl of great price. It is likened to the merchant who was seeking the pearl of great price.

One of the most important things as Christians is to have a seeking mind and a seeking heart. If you don't develop a seeking mind, then you will lose the thrill of adventure and knowledge. And it is true that your seeking mind will determine how much you progress. Paul says to seek the things that are above, where Christ is.

Now, this parable is different from the parable of the hidden treasure. In this other parable, a man stumbles across hidden treasure in a field. He wasn't seeking for the treasure. We are not told how he discovers it, but what we are told is that when he discovers it, he immediately goes off to sell all he has, liquidates all his earthly assets, forgoes all earthly pursuits in order that he may purchase that field. This, by the way, is called total abandonment.



What others sometimes see as trash, He sees as trash, He sees as treasure.

Allow me to emphasise that the man in this parable wasn't looking for the treasure. He wasn't a treasure hunter. He just stumbled upon this treasure. I say that to say the "God dreams" for your life is not often something you go out to find – it is something that finds you. I didn't choose this life. It chose me.

The truth is, many of us are here not because we were seeking and trying to discover what God was calling us to do in our lives. Many of us are here because the call of God found us. It was like a heat-seeking missile that locked in on us. Joseph wasn't looking for the dream. The dream was looking for him. David wasn't looking for the throne; the throne searched for him. Jeremiah wasn't looking to be a prophet – the call of the prophet came looking for him. Moses wasn't looking for burning bush. It found him. And it is the same with us. You did not choose Him. He chose you. You did not find Him. He found you.

But we also know that the call of God is not something arbitrary or random. God does not do random. Every visitation comes about because one man or a group of people have realised that the same old is no longer working. They set themselves to seek the Lord and obey what He tells them to do. And God responds by initiating a revival. Revival is spontaneously "deliberate." God comes because there was something of a seeking disposition in man for more but often does not know what he or she is seeking for. The second thing about the Parable is **until** you buy the field, the treasure will always belong to someone else. I don't know what the condition of the field is in the parable. We are not told. The field might not have been a very nice field, or it might have been full of thorn bushes and briars. What we do know was that it contained hidden treasure. But if we don't buy the field, the treasure will never be ours.

The field belonged to someone else. Whoever that someone else was, it was someone who did not know the value of what he had in the first place. I think the greatest gifts and calls of God often come in very unattractive fields or packages, which is why people often disregard them.

The field here could be a ministry that was originally given to someone else who did not "see" the treasure in it and completely disregards and neglects the field. God is in the recycling business. What others sometimes see as trash, He sees as treasure.

Could it be that many of us inherit promises and callings that originally belonged to someone else but who did not regard what they had? They just couldn't see pass the field. They probably thought it was such an ordinary field in the first place.

"Buying the field" means you are willing to do whatever is necessary and pay whatever the price might be, even if it means to embrace the controversies, persecutions and difficulties that come along with it. An intriguing story was told of a farmer in North Carolina who lived on a beautiful farm that his family owned for many decades. They had cultivated that same land for several generations, sowing and reaping in the fields year after year. Finally, the farmer died, and the property, after being in the family for more than two hundred years, was sold to one of the neighbours.

The new owner of the farm took possession of the field, and one day, as he was walking in the field, he saw a large, unusual looking rock just barely sticking out of the dirt. He dug it out, examined it and he instinctively knew this was no ordinary rock. So he took it home, washed it, and took it to a jewellery store in the town where he lived. The jeweller confirmed what the owner already suspected; the old stone that had been in that field for thousands of years was a large, uncut emerald that has since proved to be worth several million dollars.

Nothing comes for free if you want to be a vessel of use.

This gemstone was in that field all along just waiting for someone to come along and "discover" it.

For generations, farmer after farmer had worked in that field. Undoubtedly that "decrepit" emerald had been seen hundreds of times, and by many before, but it was overlooked because to the casual observer, it appeared to be nothing more than an ordinary rock.

Whilst many people are desperately seeking God's will for their lives, the reality is that what they are looking for is often right under their noses, but they continue to look for it because they don't recognise the value of what they have.

Is there a price to pay? You bet. When you realise what you actually have, you will be willing to do whatever is necessary to "buy" the field.

A friend of mine, Robert Henderson, shared a story with me of a father who walked into his son's room. He saw his young son standing at the corner with his head lifted up, talking to an "invisible" person. The father asked his son, "Who are you talking to?" He said to hisdad, "Can't you see the angel, dad?" The father was obviously concerned that it might be an illusion or even a demonic apparition. The next time he walked into the room, his son was again talking to this entity. He said to his son, "Ask the angel why you can see him and why I can't." So the boy asked the angel, and the angel spoke to the boy who acknowledged what the angel was saying and then turns to his dad and said the angel said "You cannot see him because your eyes have beheld too much evil." The dad immediately knew it was an angel of the Lord.

I say all that to say there's a price to pay for spiritual things. If you want to begin to see, you have to lay down a few things. You might have to stop watching a few things. You can't be watching horror and gore every day and expect God to open your eyes to spiritual realities, can you? If you want to hear, then your ears need to be circumcised. If you want to be a mouthpiece, then you have to be circumcised in your lips. Nothing comes for free if you want to be a vessel of use.

My spiritual father Dr. Brian Bailey was a man who had his eyes wide opened. He saw constantly into the realm of the spirit. He was the purest man I knew, never watched TV or movies. There are trade-offs. We have to decide what we want.

In closing, understand it is the Father's good pleasure to reveal and to bestow on us His Kingdom and the key is to have a seeking disposition. We seek through waiting because the Kingdom is only revealed by revelation. Seeking is necessary or we might just miss the pearl of great price or the hidden treasure. Why would God even want to reveal His Kingdom to you if you are not interested in it?

So seek first the Kingdom of God, and His righteousness, which is the chief attribute of His Kingdom and everything else we seek after in life will be bestowed on us by a loving Heavenly Father.

Congratulations once again on your graduation. May you never lose your seeking mind and seeking heart.

This woman's actions took the disciples by surprise. They knew Jesus Christ was God's anointed Ruler, but He didn't demand luxuries? Instead, He talked about the golden rule. To paraphrase – 'You care for this King, by caring for His people.'

Maybe the disciples were thinking, "clearly, this woman is way off with this perfume stunt."

But Jesus immediately comes to her defense.

He honoured her for her lavish generosity. A whole year's worth of wages poured over Him! In just two days, the body she anointed would be dead, shamefully dishonoured with a public execution only fit for slaves and criminals. Jesus Christ was the King of all kings, but He never demanded the red carpet treatment (He was more about riding donkeys on palm leaves). Jesus, with His inversion of power created the upside-down Kingdom where the King would come not to be served, but to serve.

In Matthew 26, we see a deep display of affection, honour, and a seeking of Jesus – the woman with the alabaster jar. What could prompt such an outpouring of great honour? Whatever the reason, it was remarkable – filling the house with a fragrance and offering fit for a King!

I wonder if some of this regal aroma lingered when Jesus hung between heaven and earth as the 'rejected' King of the Jews.

Anointing Jesus, seeking Him first turns out to be the most important moment this woman will ever have engaged with. She honoured the King with a heart of **true** honour, while His friends slated her, and His enemies schemed His ending.

There are thousands of people who met Jesus, we know nothing about them. But this woman is remembered even today whenever the good news of the King is heard. Why? She **sought** the Lord the very moment the world was dividing over Him.

Within two months, the King she sought after had ascended to the throne, seated at the right hand of God.

She chose to pour out her affections for the King of Kings. May we do the same.



Reflection on Lesson: A Life of Intercession

Taught by Sam Matthews

2 The first principle of intercession is a completely surrendered self – a willingness to yield and offer yourself up wholly and completely as a vessel that God may have full control of.

God "sought for a man... who would make a wall... but found no one" (Ezekiel 22:30). God was not searching for someone who could be an intercessor but who would. This implies that the call of intercession is open to all who are willing to. In order for God to make His intercessions through us (Romans 8:26-28), we must allow God to inhabit us, relinquishing all control of ourselves over to Him.

In order for God to make His inter(essions through us, we must allow God to inhabit us, relinquishing all control of ourselves over to Him.

> The second principle of intercession is that intercession must be directed by God – interceding in the direction God reveals, and not based on our own understanding and desires.

> As our intercessor, Jesus Christ speaks only as the Father speaks – the authority He holds in His words and deeds were accorded to Him only because He followed solely the direction of the Father (John 14:10-14). For our intercession to hold authority that we may bind the strongman (Matthew 12:29) and fight against principalities and powers (Ephesians 6:12), we need to follow the directive given by God.

By His gra(e, God has (alled us to live from a heavenly realm and not from an earthly perspective.

3 Hebrews 10:19 says that we can enter the Most Holy Place by the blood of Jesus, drawing near to God to worship and to have fellowship with Him. We have been raised and seated with Christ in the heavenly realms (Ephesians 2:6).

By His grace, God has called us to live from a heavenly realm and not from an earthly perspective. In John 17:14-16, Jesus prayed for his disciples, stating that they are not of this world.

Even though we live physically in the world, our citizenship is in heaven (Philippians 3:20). A.W. Tozer explains, "When God infuses eternal life into the spirit of a man, the man becomes a member of a new and higher order of being." Developing a "throne life" is the union that we have with Christ. He in us, and we in Christ (1 John 4:13-15). Colossians 3:1-3 says that we have died, and our life is hidden with Christ in God.

Throughout the gospels, Jesus only did what he saw and heard the Father doing (John 5:19). He had constant communion with the Father. We have access to the throne room, to hear what the Father and Holy Spirit is saying and do what He asks us to do.

When we have the revelation that we are seated with Christ, we understand the authority and responsibility we have been given for intercession and spiritual warfare, and to bring the Kingdom of God to earth as it is in heaven (Matthew 6:10).

10 I was so gripped by how real the Spirit is, how all consuming and transformative an encounter with His presence is. That we can't help but be renewed and made aware of our iniquities as we enter into His presence. I was also impacted by the level of humility the people in the College had demonstrated before God during the visitation. From being prostrate at His feet as He moved, to thinking about the impact it would have to the world and having such reverence for Him that they dare not raise their voices. I understood the significance of corporate prayer and anointing - how it allows for God to move through us for His appointed purpose and is much less about us than abiding to His will as one body.



The Holy Ghost Takes Possession is a 5 significant chapter that details out the desire of the Holy Spirit to inhabit the believer to such an extent where He lives His life in us. I believe that the same Spirit of God is speaking this invitation to us today. I love that moment when the life of the Spirit takes over and the moment where self goes out, and everything selfish and self-centred goes with it. This is true Christianity! How He yearns to take us into something so much higher and deeper, but we are the ones who hold back and try to preserve areas of our lives when there are realms and realms of His presence within that sacred veil available for us. With great surrender comes great power to change, and I am asking for the Holy Spirit to possess me more and more this day. I'm holding nothing back, Lord!

The Visitation of the Spirit is another significant chapter in my reading and it has stirred me to believe God for more. It was one thing to have a man fully consecrated to the life of the Spirit, but to have an entire collective of people with one heart and one purpose as a living integrated organism brings to mind the prayer of Jesus in John 17, "that they all may be one, as You, Father, are in Me, and I in You; that they also may be one in Us, that the world may believe that You sent Me."

To have known that such a company existed with such oneness (one with God and one another) stirs me to believe for it. Jesus, may You have a company on earth who will be one as You are with the Father!

One chapter that was significant for me was 6 Chapter 6, titled "Loving an Outcast." What I found significant was the instructions he received from the Holy Spirit about his prayer life. In the preceding chapter, we read of the Holy Spirit coming into Mr. Rees Howells' life, making it clear that He wanted sole ownership. And here in this chapter, we read of how this started to become a reality. Not only did the Holy Spirit began to deal with Mr. Rees Howells' self, that part of us that wants its own way, wants a comfortable life, wants to make all the choices, but He started to deal with his prayer life. Mr. Rees Howells was no longer to pray for all kinds of things. He was now to pray only as guided. And he was to pray until he received an answer. He was also, never again, to ask God to answer a prayer through others if God could answer it through him, and this was to include his finances.

I have heard so many stories of the Welsh Revival, and it's amazing to be able to read it while in the land where it took place. Every revival ordained by God is unique, this one focused on two things, "Disobedience" and "Unforgiving Hearts." Norman Grubb writes that these were "Two sins that were constantly dealt with, that there was a need to pray out the hindrances to allow blessings to come in." This was significant for me as it allowed me to understand God's heart for Mr. Rees Howells and His people, He wants us to live in obedience to Him. His heart for His people is to know Him and live according to His way. God dealt with the hearts of people through the revival. It says in this chapter that the "Enduement of the Holy Spirit was needed" to usher in the Welsh Revival and sustain it. It gave me a lens to see how the life of Mr. Rees Howells was very much Spirit-led, such that he would not make a single decision without the guidance of His Spirit. Every decision he made was in tandem with His will.

Even in the midst of a revival, there will still be people who are unreached, and that is why those touched by the Holy Spirit in the revival are thrust forth to continue the sharing of the Gospel.

What strikes me most in Chapter 7 was that despite walking with the Lord closely and having such a strong foundation and zeal for God, Mr. Rees Howells was taunted by the devil, which really goes to show that none of us are immune to the works of the devil. This was further seen in later chapters of his life, that while the Glory of God was always seen through his personal journey, there was also constant accusation and taunting as well.

The higher Mr. Rees Howells went with God, the more was required of him. 1 John 4:20 talks of how "The closer a person is to God, the more terrible is the least sin seen to be." The deeper he walked with the Lord, the more the enemy had to accuse him of. We must never take for granted our faith in Him, and always make it a point to build and grow it.

"Neither skill nor knowledge is needed to go

all others." God is not looking for the most
intelligent people, most creative or most
skilled people. He just wants you to love Him
above everyone and everything. God wants to
be the centre of our lives. He does not expect
us to be theologians to spend time with him.
He just wants intimacy with us. His presence
is there for us to receive as a gift. We just need
to seek it and become more aware and more
sensitive to His presence.

Another aspect of the story of Brother Lawrence that changed the way I viewed my Christian walk, was the way he aspired to be the best at everything he did. Not because he wanted to be the best but because he wanted his best to be a way to please the Lord, in a form of worshipping God. I have always wanted to do the best I could do at my work, but I have never invited God into that space. Praying and asking God to be with me as I work, and to allow me to do my very best, and thanking Him for His assistance. As well as praying and speaking to God even while we are working. Allowing ourselves to draw nearer to the Lord, and to remain in His presence as long as we can.

This book has shown the concept of getting God involved in everything I do. Brother Lawrence asked God what he should do and how to live his life. Getting God involved in the decision making is something I aspire to inculcate in my life on this earth.

Being here in the BCW has taught me about surrendering my all to God and how I can revolve my life around him on a daily and regular basis. This had a profound impact on my life. I now think that we live to have a relationship with God and that we should get him involved in our daily lives. It is especially inspiring when one of my classmates, Sandra, asks God in everything she does. I used to believe that practicing God's presence involved reading the Bible, meditating on His Word, worshipping Him, and having quiet times. I thought that these practices alone could draw me near to God's presence. However, after reading this book, I realised that practicing God's presence is also simply having a conversation with Him. Sometimes my mind gets caught up in trivial thoughts and I can complicate things unnecessarily, but God's presence is always within reach regardless. I can talk to Father God about anything, anytime, and anywhere. Before I start on any task, I should commit it into His hands and invite the Holy Spirit's guidance. It's about doing everything purely out of love for God, whether it's church duties or secular work. This involves opening up my heart and inviting God to be involved in every area of my life. As the Bible states in Colossians 3:23, "Whatever you do, work at it with all your heart, as working for the Lord, not for human masters."

In the third conversation, Brother Lawrence mentioned that neither skill nor knowledge is required to approach God. What matters most is a heart dedicated entirely and solely to Him out of love above all else. Like many Christians, I've been too preoccupied with wanting to discern my next season, next step, and God's purpose and calling in my life. In pursuit of all these, I have lost the main focus! Whereas the Bible states what I should do is "seek first His Kingdom". Brother Lawrence also highlighted in the book that if we do the smallest chores out of pure love of God, it is living a life with purpose. So why am I so fixated on chasing after a specific purpose and calling? The key practice should be to constantly communicate with God. In all of our thoughts, words and actions, no matter how small and mundane, if they are done with God in mind, become like worshipful prayer to Him.

- The quote that inspired transformation in my daily devotion to Christ is from page 23 where Brother Lawrence says, "our actions should unite us with God when we are involved in our daily activities, just as our prayers unite us with Him in our quiet devotions." Upon reading this, Acts 17:28 immediately came to mind, "for in Him we live and move and have our being." It struck me then, the reality of the fact that we are created to be one with Him. I've always known this but it sunk into me just exactly how intrinsic worship and unity with God is to us. As natural and inescapable as the atmosphere of the earth. God is not just a part of our lives. What a disservice it would be to God to say that! He is our life! In all of our thoughts, words and actions, no matter how small and mundane, if they are done with God in mind, become like worshipful prayer to Him. And I believe this is one way to fulfill what Apostle Paul talked about in 1 Thessalonians 5:17, to "pray without ceasing." Which is not to say we lock ourselves up in a tower and do nothing except pray but rather that everything we do becomes prayer, a sweetsmelling aroma forever before our God. Chapter 02 OUR SEDER & FEAST OF TABERNACLES

PART 1

Gentile Believers on Celebrating the Feast of Tabernacles

The Feast of Tabernacles (Sukkot) being one of the major Jewish feasts is a reminder of how God brought His people out of Egypt and made them live in temporary tents and miraculously provided for their needs. The Jews celebrate this feast for seven days by building temporary tents/booths with palms and leafy branches. These booths are very frail, which serves as a reminder of God's provision and deliverance.

According to the scriptures, as a Gentile, I too am a chosen one.

Romans 11:11 "Again I ask: Did they (Jews) stumble so as to fall beyond recovery? Not at all! Rather, because of their transgression (unbelief), salvation has come to the Gentiles to make Israel envious."

Romans 9:8 "...it is not the children of the flesh who are children of God, but the children of the promise are regarded as descendants."

The Feast of Tabernacles helps me align with God's redemptive plan for me. Just like God set His people free from Egypt (slavery); Jesus delivers us from sin. I am no more a bonded slave, but I am invited to recline at the table with Him as a free

> person. Secondly, these temporary tents clearly point out that life on Earth is temporary, and with God dwelling in our midst we can rely on Him for our every need/provision and not on our own ability. Overall, it's a prophetic view that God will finally tabernacle and dwell with His people, establishing His Messianic Kingdom of righteousness.



The Feast of Tabernacles was to celebrate the ingathering of the harvest (Leviticus 23:39-40). It is also prophetically pointing towards the final harvest before the return of Christ. There have been many prophecies about the "billion soul harvest" which the end time generation will see before the coming of the Lord. As Gentile believers we can partner and pray to the Lord of the harvest to send forth (ekballo) His labourers as we prepare for the ingathering of the final harvest of souls that will come to Christ. We are also to go and bring the gospel of the Kingdom to every creature, from the ends of the earth and back to Jerusalem.

It is likely that the Wedding Feast, the marriage supper of the Lamb will happen during the Feast of Tabernacles. The Lamb will marry His Bride. He will tabernacle with us and we will dwell with Him forever. As Gentile believers, we are to make ourselves ready and live preparing for His return.

As it is the Feast of Booths (Leviticus 23:42-43), as in the days when Israel lived in tents, we too are to live on this earth as sojourners on this earth, living not for the things of this world but rather we are to live for His Kingdom.

PART 2 Our Messiah in the Seder

In a Seder meal, receiving the hand-fed "Korech" is an expression of giving honour. Capturing the upper room moment where Jesus fed Judas, He is communicating to Judas, "Judas, you do me honour," "Judas, I love you," "Judas, I forgive you, don't do it." Knowing how the night ended that day, I was left undone. Jesus knew very well from the beginning that Judas was about to betray Him, but He did not treat him indifferently. Seeing how He welcomed Judas to sit on His left-hand side at the Seder meal, shows the love that He has for sinners - inviting them, giving them the best place with His love embracing them without partiality. Sadly Judas, having spent three years walking with Jesus; healing, casting out demons, seeing the dead raised to life and so many creative miracles failed to recognise the ways of this wonderful Saviour. I can't even imagine how Jesus must have felt when He saw that Judas had hardened his heart, yet, that didn't stop Him; He went ahead and fed Judas the morsel saying those words. With humility, Jesus has set a perfect example of loving, forgiving, and embracing our enemies. When we accept Him as our Lord, God, and Savior; He expects us to do the same. The act of feeding shows that we are to go beyond forgiving, it is liken to starting anew, giving a second chance, and believing for their redemption.

It absolutely baffled me that so many elements in the Seder meal points to the coming Messiah, Jesus Christ. For example, the Matzah clearly points to the body of Jesus, broken, and then hidden as the Tzafoon (which also means hidden, buried or locked away), pointing to Jesus' broken body, wrapped in cloth and being buried (for three days). The hidden piece, Tzafoon, is half of the broken middle Matzah from the Yachatz, wrapped in cloth and hidden away for the children to find just before the cup of the redemption, Barech. This hidden piece is "redeemed" by the head of the house from the children with some sweets or coins called "The Promise of the Father," which is what Jesus said to the disciples to wait for before He ascended to the Father. What is most amazing about this "Tzafoon" is its Greek translation "Afikomen," which means "I came!" The Tzafoon/ Afikomen poignantly points to Jesus' resurrection before the "promise of the Father" is released. The "Afikomen" is such a prophetic message to all the Jews who partake of the Seder meal. Each time they eat the Afikomen, it is as if Yeshua is speaking to each one of them saying, "I CAME;" "I have already come;" "This is me, Jesus, Yeshua HaMaschiah, the Messiah that you have been waiting for, I can be found!"

and resurrection) and to offer an urgent open invitation into a relationship with Him (through repentance from sin, turning to Christ in faith and believing that He is the Son of God). Thus, the "Every Creature" mandate is both a transmission of information and a transformative response; it is a dynamic spiritual process of evangelism, leading to reconciliation with God and the beginning of a new life in Christ – A NEW CREATION.

A PERSONAL/CORPORATE RESPONSIBILITY:

We have a responsibility before God to be living letters of Christ for our generation (2 Corinthians 3:3; Acts 13:36) and are commanded to go and preach the gospel in power (Matthew 28:18-20; Mark 16:15-20; Luke 24:46-47; John 20:21; Acts 4:31; Acts 5:32)! However, when I really think about it, it's not just a "responsibility", it's a PRIVILEGE – being a second-generation Christian is a blessing that is not afforded to many, and I must steward it well, so that "Every Creature" will one day have this privilege too!

STANDING IN THE GAP:

This is through my support in finances (Philippians 4:15-16), encouragement (Philemon 1:6), provisions (3 John 1:5-8) and intercession (Romans 10:1). Just as Jesus sits at the right hand of God and intercedes for us (Romans 8:34; Hebrews 7:25), we too should intercede for those who are perishing and have been blinded by the gods of this age to unveil the gospel (2 Corinthians 4:3-4).



No matter their race, nationalities, languages, their character, their financial status and whoever they are, as long as they have breath under their nose and are living, all be given the chance to hear the gospel.

2 The "Every Creature" mandate given to Mr. Rees Howells was a direct word from the Lord to see Jesus Christ's final command before He went to the Father as per Mark 16:15 fulfilled. What was strikingly different in this account was how deeply personal the Lord was asking Mr. Rees Howells and his company of people to obey this mandate, and to be personally responsible for its fulfilment. The words from the LORD, "I am dwelling in you, can I be responsible for this through you?" meant that they now were His vessels and were to give their all to see it fulfilled.

This call is doubtless for every disciple of Christ, and the more I read Mr. Rees Howells' account and let the Lord speak to me through it, it is a wonder how some can see it as optional. I believe in the "Every Creature" mandate and the more I pray into it, the more I feel that call is as personal as Mr. Rees Howells had felt.

If the Holy Spirit's desire is to make Christ's atonement real in every creature, I say "yes!" I say "yes" to pray for salvations, to intercede for the removal of every hindrance to the gospel, to ask for labourers to be sent, and to be numbered among those who are sent. The Father desires that none should perish and that all should be saved. To embrace His desire and to live it out is our high calling and God will give all the grace and provision needed to see this vision come to pass. The Father that sent the Son is now sending us and He will give the Spirit without measure (John 3:34). What an honour to bear His name, be His vessel and to speak His words! May we all be willing vessels for Him today.

5 Mark 16:15-16, "And He said to them, 'Go into all the world and preach the gospel to every creature. He who believes and is baptised will be saved; but he who does not believe will be condemned."



My understanding of "Every Creature" mandate is that the gospel is to be proclaimed to every creature. No matter their race, nationalities, languages, their character, their financial status and whoever they are, as long as they have breath under their nose and are living, all be given the chance to hear the gospel. 
